Title: The ivy and the Urn

I'm a member of the Royal Society of Sculptors since 1994, and practice as a sculptor as much as a painter. My response to the contours of Mike's lovely wood-turned 'urn' was a 3D one; I had the idea of ivy following the shape of the urn as it might have done the original tree from which the piece was turned. In this way I thought it would be nice to engage wood with wood; reduction with accretion. Whilst scouring the Norfolk countryside for dry 'seasoned' ivy that actually fitted the contours of the turned wood I enjoyed the conceptual aspects that I felt could be brought to the piece, - ideas about artifice and nature and the contrast of pure and random form. I was thinking also of the traditional symbolic aspects of the urn as a receptacle of life-giving water as well as its use as a vessel for funeral ashes: a reminder of life, death and regeneration. I thought it was interesting to make an intervention that implied the passage of time. I might add that the ivy part of the artefact is completely desiccated and is quite strong, Even the couple of remaining leaves that venture into the surrounding space are stable and shouldn't break with 'normal usage'.

## Chris Moody 23cm Dish Gouache on Gesso



Title: 'Imperator' (gouache on gesso ground).

The badly eroded statue of George II at the Old Royal Naval College, Greenwich is usually neglected in favour of the vista to the Queen's House and Observatory but I have always loved it as a rare English example of the sort of baroque statuary you see much more frequently elsewhere in Europe. So I gave it the central place in my composition with Wren's domes acknowledging it on either side. The airship clouds and shadows are meant to give it a de Chirico flavour.

Frances Prokofiev 18cm Ash Dish Oil Paint





Title: 'Tribute Bowl' (decoration of a bowl made of ash wood)

I have painted this bowl as a tribute to the Common Ash (Fraxinus Excelsior) which is threatened by Ash Dieback disease that will bring about the loss of at least 75% of the ash trees in this country and is a worldwide threat. In the last few years I have been documenting the ash trees in the area around our barn in Norfolk where we spend part of our time. I want to understand and draw or express the effect that Ash Dieback disease is having on the trees themselves as well as trying to get an understanding of how the landscape will be changed. It is important that we understand what we are going to lose. For this reason I

It is important that we understand what we are going to lose. For this reason I have also been simply looking at and making artwork about the visual characteristics of the ash. its compound leaves (see the base of the Tribute Bowl); the generous curving habit of its branches which lift up at their end; its pale grey bark which looks silver against a blue sky and the way the smooth trunk of young ash trees becomes deeply engraved in a diamond-like pattern as it ages.

This project is tinged with sadness; it is impossible not to express feelings about loss. This project is a huge one and I expect to continue it for some time. In a broader sense it touches on the ecological state of the world today and the vulnerability of our over-populated world.

Title: 'I Am Not Broken'

A borrow from the Japanese art of Kintsugi, repairing broken pottery with precious metal. Kintsugi treats breakage and repair as part of the history of an object rather than a way of disguising damage.

Title: 'Hold on' - Sophie M Cook

Sophie M Cook is an oil painter based in Kent. Much of her work focuses on florals, she is continually fascinated by their complex forms and how the different colour relationships can inform the idea for a painting. The majestic form of the magnolias seemed the perfect choice for this shapely wood turned vase. The title of this piece draws on the fact that fossil records suggest magnolias were around during the Cretaceous period, making this flower a remarkable testament to endurance and permanence.

Normally my ceramics are Raku fired and often incorporate other materials, rubber tops, wood and fabric. Raku is an ancient ceramic process developed in Japan. This process is risky, pots do crack and break. With paint I have tried to recreate my most popular turquoise glaze and the sort of unexpected and unrepeatable effects of this process. I have attempted to interpret the Japanese method of 'Kintsugi', repairing a special ceramic in the belief that scars should not be hidden.

Title: 'Suka'

"I wanted my painting to be elegant, magical and beautiful so I chose to paint a Japanese cherry blossom tree. The name given to this bowl, 'Suka', is Japanese for 'to bloom' or alternatively 'to smile' which I found it made me do. I felt that by using a Japanese title it would bring the picture to life even further and create intrigue for those who don't know what it means. Numerous techniques were used to create this piece, such as dabbing white paint with a sponge across the front of the bowl to create a canvas but also to soften the background; I continued this layering technique to add colour and tone and used a fine paint brush to add the detail of the cherry blossom."


Title: 'Nuts'
